Dear Reader,


The following document contains survey results as part of the Camas Public Library's strategic planning efforts, conducted during the second half of 2018.

The Library employed the methods of the Harwood Institute, in which libraries turn outward toward their communities to discover first what makes an ideal place to live. Next, the Library took the input of the citizens on how to improve the community, and worked those needs into the Library's strategic plan. Library services become more meaningful when they are couched in the greater needs of the community, rather than asking patrons simply how to improve the Library.

This survey was one methodology used in gathering community input for the Library's strategic plan. The survey was administered online and via one-on-one conversations at community events. There were roughly 300 respondents. Camas Public Library's strategic plan can be found on our website.

The survey and its results follow. For Question 5, any Library-specific suggestions or feedback have been kept in a separate document and can be made available upon request.
