

Adolescent Mental Health Summit

More than 200 people attended 35 workshops and classes at six venues around Camas on Saturday, October 13th, for the first-ever Camas Wellness Festival. The Library joined forces with the creator, Erika Levy, to host the workshops that focused on wellness for teens and tweens. This later became known as the Adolescent Mental Health Summit.

At the Library alone mental health experts presented 11 workshops on topics including Performance Culture and Academic Stress, Your Teen's Secret Life at School and Outside Your Home, Recognizing Anxiety and Depression, and Mindful Parenting.

We estimate that 120-150 people attended the events in the Library. While organizers are pleased with this number, it is lower than the number of people who pre-registered online (300 for the entire festival), which is typical.

"Where I thought we were extremely successful is raising awareness," said Erika Levy. "We now have all the recordings of the sessions that need to be edited and put on the website. It will be a wonderful resource for the community."

One of the event organizers, Kimberly Berry of the Being UnNormal podcast, has been leveraging the media coverage of the Wellness Festival for more exposure about mental health issues, especially those affecting youth. She will be partnering with the Library once again, this time to bring her podcast to the Library for a live, interactive audience participation version called Being UnNormal Live! The first one is Tuesday, November 27th, and will focus on surviving the holidays. These will also be archived.




